FROM THE PRESIDENT

It is a pleasure to welcome you to this year's edition of FLOREX, the general meeting of the Florida Federation of Stamp Clubs.



This year's edition is bigger than ever with over 250 frames of exhibits. We have expanded the floor space. We have some of the top judges in the U.S. in a unique judging experiment.

We have come a long way from that first organizational meeting at the Dennis Hotel in St. Petersburg on December 18, 1949. Four clubs participated in the founding, but seven clubs with a total of 312 members were on the Charter Membership roll on April 15, 1950.

The fourth convention in 1953 was the first to be called FLOREX. A spring meeting was begun in 1954 and became known as STAMPOREE in 1956. The FFSC MONTHLY BULLETIN began in 1951 and became THE FLORIDA PHILATELIST in 1958. Today, we have over 50 clubs and about 2,000 members.

To those of you who are reading this journal for the first time, we invite you to join one of the clubs listed on the back cover. At most clubs, you will find friendly people who are willing to share their philatellic knowledge. I believe that your enjoyment of the hobby will be enhanced by participating in a local club.

The general business meeting of the Federation will take place on Saturday, November 4 at 11:00 a.m. We will be electing officers for the next two years and hearing business reports that will be reported in the next issue. Until then, best wishes to the 40th birthday of our Federation and happy stamping!

DINOSAURS DEBUT AT DISNEY

Stamp Collecting Month started in a big way for the 500 guests who attended the first-day ceremony for the dinosaur stamps at Epcot Center on October 1.

Previously, it was reported that one had to pay the regular admission fee to get in to the ceremony, but this turned out to be untrue. The Disney people set up a table outside the entrance gates at 9:00 a.m. and dispensed free one day tickets to any ceremony attendee on a first come, first served basis. About 250 seats had been reserved for dignitaries and guests of the Post Office.

So why didn't Disney advertise that the tickets were free? They could have converted thousands to stamp collecting on the spot from tourists who would have welcomed free admission. I'm sure they would have had a turn-away crowd of Central Florida stamp collectors and many disappointed people. As it was, there were a few empty seats.

The ceremony was held just inside the Exxon World of Energy with the smooth style one expects from Disney. Guests were ushered in to the 10:00 program to hear a brass quintet. A 16 piece marching band played the National Anthem with the flurry of a dozen US flags.

The participants on the program were Bob Davis of the Tampa regional office and Rick Hyde, the new Orlando Postmaster. Bob Mathis, Executive Director of Disney parks, gave a welcome. Then Postmaster General Anthony Frank made appropriate remarks, and introduced John Gurche, the stamp artist. After unveiling the stamps, he invited guests to take the ride through the World of Energy to see the dinosaurs.

Guests received a free souvenir program upon leaving the attraction. They then went next door to the yet unopened Wonders of Life pavillion for a buffet lunch and conversation. There was not a traditional autograph ceremony, but I was able to get signatures from everyone except for Frank and Mathis.




Other guests at the ceremony included Assistant Postmaster Gordon Morrison and APS Director Keith Wagner. Local collectors included Werner Bohne, Phil Fettig, Dr. Doug Quine, Bob Ward, and Lou Etherton. First day enthusiasts Saul Freiss and Norman Solomon came from Miami.

The Postal Service had a special station set up in the information center under Spaceship Earth. They were selling stamps and servicing cancellations from nine to four. Besides stamps, they were selling first day programs for \$5.95, a \$3.00 souvenir folder with cancellation, and a special poster with cancellation for \$25.

The ceremonial program itself is a three dimensional pop-up art showing all four dinosaurs. This issue represents a major push by the Postal Service to interest new and novice collectors in the hobby.

Already Linn's has received several irate letters from those upset that the ceremony took place where you had to pay to get in. But this time, Disney was not the big bad wolf. They were gracious hosts trying in every way to impress the Postal Service and collectors that they were important guests. It's just too bad that more collectors couldn't have known of the generosity and taken advantage of a most pleasant occasion.

COVER OF THE MONTH



Gary Hauslin of New England Stamp in Naples sent along this copy of an interesting Florida cover. It is not completely clear as to what all the marks are, and maybe some of our readers would like to suggest answers to this philatelic question.

It seems that the cover was posted in Philadelphia on February 11 to a Thomas R Ingram(?) Esq. in St. Augustine, FLa. The stamp is perforated so it is a #25 or #26 produced after 1857.

The addressee was not in St. Augustine so it was forwarded on Feb. 19 to Palatka. Notice that the older spelling of Pilatka is used. Palatka is a river town located on the St. Johns about 12 miles SW of St. Augustine. Below Pilatka is a manuscript which appears to be a misspelled Mellonville. This town was located just east of present day Sanford on the shores of Lake Monroe. This appears to be the final destination as it was about the last stop on most St. John's riverboats.

In the upper left, it appears that when the letter was forwarded, there was an additional three (Ford 3) cent charge. Under the top "For 3" is written what could be Mellonvil? partially written on the face of the stamp.

If only this cover could talk, what a tale it might tell. It still is able to tell us a lot.

FLOREX '89 JUDGES

THE EXPERIMENT- Clyde Jennings, a distinguished judge and Federation President, conceived of a unique experiment in philatelic judging. Last year he invited a panal of very experienced judges to give "The Old Guard" opinions. At the same time he invited a group of "Young Turks" for 1989 to compare how they would judge many of the same exhibits. For that reason, many of the exhibitors from 1988 were invited to return for 1989. We hope the results will help predict what the future will be like in judging.

THE 1989 PANAL

Mrs. Patricia Walker returns to FLOREX as Chief of Judges. Previously she served her first apprenticeship and judgeship here. She is past president of the Ireland Philatelic Society and has won Grand Prizes with her Ireland exhibit.

Richard Drews comes from the Chicago Collectors Club where he serves as the General Chairman of CHICAGO '92. He is an expert in US Classics.

Doug Kelsey is an Executive Director of the Western Postal History Museum in Tuscon, AZ. He is from Cleveland and helps direct The March Party of the Garfield Perry Stamp Club.

Dr. Peter McCann has been a chief judge. He is a specialist in the issues of the Caribbean.

Dr. Robert Rosende is the Chairman of The Philatelic Foundation. He is an expert in the issues of Cuba.

The 1988 judges were Bill Bauer, Werner Bohne, Ernest Cohn, George Guzzio, and Phil Ireland. They have been invited to return just as the other panal was here last year to give unofficial opinions.


FLOREX '89 SOUVENIRS

FLOREX TO HOST YOUTH IN 1990

In order to encourage youth to exhibit their collections, the first American Youth Stamp Exhibit Championship (AYSEC) will take place at FLOREX '90. This contest is being sponsored by the American Association of Philatelic Exhibitors and is the idea of Carl Burnett of Melbourne, Florida.

To qualify, an exhibit must be entered into one of the 35 World Series of Philately national shows and receive the youth Grand Award with at least a silver level rating. Qualifying started at the STaMpsHOW in August and will run for one year. Floridians can still enter at SARAPEX and STAMPOREE.

Lewis Etherton, Youth Chairman, has invited every school in a three county area to attend this year's FLOREX and has encouraged the youth to exhibit. For more information write AYSEC, PO Box 1987, Melbourne, FL 32902-1987.

FLOREX POSTAL HISTORY SEMINAR

Although not sponsored by FLOREX, Dr. Ken Schoolmeester of Greensboro, N.C. organized a Postal History Seminar for Thursday, November 2, at the Omni Hotel. About 35 paid the \$30 fee and attended receiving a Seminar Handbook.

Among the topics covered were selecting a topic, research, acquiring the material, and displaying the collection. The afternoon session covered writing for the philatelic press, expertising, and use of computers.


The panal of presenters was to include Lowell Newman of Fox Auctions, Brian Green, Dr. Harvey Tillis, William J. Bomar, Richard Helblock, and Dr. Doug Quine. If seminars like this one prove successful, they would be a great incentive to collectors to get the information they need to become exhibitors or at least more knowledgeble. Schoolmeester has previously organized seminars like this in Arizona.

F.F.S.C. FALL CONVENTIONS

FLOREX '89 marks the 40th fall convention for the Florida Federation of Stamp Clubs. The first took place Dec. 2, 1950 in Winter Haven and was called the All-State Convention. It has been held in 13 different cities over the years with St. Petersburgs the most at 10.

It has been called FLOREX since 1953. In 1952 it was called EXSTAMP when it was first held at Tampa. You can imagine the trouble that Tampa would have naming its exhibit in normal philatelic language.

The first 20 years saw it sponsored by different local clubs; but since 1970, it is a function of the Federation. However, local participation is important as eight of this year's committee are members of the Central Florida Stamp Club.

AMERICAN AIR MAIL SOCIETY

The American Air Mail Society, organized in 1923, is one of the oldest and largest aerophilatelic societies in the world. Its members collect everything from Balloon Posts of the Siege of Paris to more modern airpost items, such as Jet and Rocket Mail, U.S. First Flights, and Transoceanic and Foreign Flight Covers. The dues are low (\$12 per year) and the privileges and services many.

Being a cooperative group, organized solely to assist airpost collectors, the American Air Mail Society is not operated for profit. All of its officers, managers, and writers serve without compensation. The AIRPOST JOURNAL is the official monthly publication of the Society. It is a generously illustrated magazine that covers the entire field of aerophilately. Feature articles, written by leading students in the field, are presented each month with photos of many of the covers being discussed. Included are the advertisements of many of the leading aerophilatelic dealers of the world.

The Society publishes the now famous American Air Mail Catalogue, now in a fifth edition comprising five volumes. In it can be found the priced listings of many different aerophilatelic specialties. In addition, the Society publishes handbooks on a regular basis, the most recent one being on the topic of Glider Mail.

Other benefits of membership include an advance bulletin service, where members are informed of coming first flights and airport dedications, frequent auctions, where members may dispose of unwanted material or purchase fine additions to their collections, a sales department offering covers and stamps at reasonable prices, free exchange advertisements, a translation service, local chapters, meetings, etc.

The State of Florida has contributed greatly to the advancement of United States air mail by taking a leading role, especially in international air mail, as the gateway to the Caribbean. Central and South America.

Famed fliers such as Charles Lindbergh and Edwin Musick flew to and from Florida while aircraft such as the Caribbean Clipper and the Graf Zeppelin were also known to the area. Many pilots, aircraft and events gained national and international recognition through their ties with Florida and air mail.

Following are a few of the significant events which took place in the 1920's and 1930's to, from, and through Florida that left an indelible mark on air mail and aviation history.



On November 1, 1920, Florida West Indies Airways inaugurated Foreign Air Mail (FAM) route number 4 from Key West, Florida, to Havana, Cuba, using converted ex-Navy F-5L flying boats. The mail was accepted and flown from Key West to Havana on that date (figure 1). The cover shown is one of 50 prepared and flown on the flight. However, there was no return dispatch as the Cuban postal authorities had not awarded the companion air mail contract.

This route was operated until June 1921 when all service was suspended until January 1923 when Aeromarine Airways, Inc. attempted to revive the route, but only operated it for a period of less than three weeks. Service was not resumed again until Pan American Airways was awarded the contract on October 19, 1927 (figure 2). Pan American's United States terminal was moved from Key West, Florida to Miami, Florida, on September 15, 1928.




January 2, 1929, saw the start of Foreign Air Mail (FAM) route number 7 between Miami, Florida, and Nassau in the Bahama Islands. The route was operated on a daily basis by Pan American Airways, Inc. through the winter season and twice weekly during the remainder of the year. The inaugural flight from Miami to Nassau was piloted by Harry Rogers and the cost for a 1/2 ounce letter was 7 cents, this was during the 5 cent per ounce/ 10 cents per each additional ounce rate period (figure 3). However, the mail from Nassau to Miami was charged only the first class rate.

From October 14 to December 2, 1933, the Graf Zeppelin made a special mail carrying flight from Freidrichshafen, Germany via Recife, Rio de Janerio, Pernambuco, Miami (fig. 4) and Akron to Chicago, Ill., for the Century of Progress Exposition. This was the Graf Zeppelin's 50th trans-Atlantic crossing which returned to Germany by via Akron and Seville.

For this event, the United States and Germany issued special stamps. The US issued the 50 cent (#C-18) which paid the rate for letters or post cards. On October 23, 1933, the Graf Zeppelin (LZ-127) left Miami, Florida, for Chicago, Illinois via Akron, Ohio. This was one of the few instances where a foreign carrier was allowed to carry mail between US cities.



A FLORIDA PLANE CRASH

by Stephen Patrick

Randy Savadow of The Browse House has provided the following crash cover that is part of his personal collection. His interest stems from the fact that the crash took place just a few miles away from where he grew up in Daytona Beach and where he continues to work with his father in the stamp business.



The American Air Mail Society Catalogue describes the details of the flight. On March 1, 1929, a Pitcairn Aviation Corp. plane experienced motor failure on take off and plunged into the Halifax River. On board was 500 pounds of mail which became watersoaked. Many stamps became separated from their covers.

This was a first flight of a spur service of Daytona Beach - Tampa. The letter was posted at 10:30 a.m. and the reverse has a REC'D. mark from Orlando, Fla. at 3:30 p.m. the same day. A very faint rubber stamped marking appears on the left. It reads, "FIRST FLIGHT", "ATLANTA-MIAMI", above and below an eagle with a circle above its head. In the circle, it seems to read, "Air Mail, CAM 25 ...".



This particular cover was sent by Louis C. Knorr of Lynn, Massachusettes, to the Postmaster of Orlando, Fla. On the cover, Claudia DaLaney, Orlando Postmaster, has noted, "Damaged in the mails - First flight plane fell into the Halifax River." Since the Post Office added no official markings to the mails, only those noted like this and by a postal inspector have evidence of the crash on the cover.

The contents include a note from DaLaney that she has a number of stamps, and that the one she included seemed to match the markings on the letter. I have used a stamp hinge to re-position the stamp on the cover. Imagine the postal workers spreading out hundreds of letters to dry and trying to match the stamps to the letters. This seems to be one of the few times when the Post Office soaked off the stamp for the collector.






